MOVING TOWARDS OUR CHURCH BUILDING

- By mid-Jan 1928 Land was purchased for the Church at Ashgrove.
- More fund-raising activities
- By mid-Oct 1929 land had been purchased for the rectory and the Church. The total cost of the venture was £1,534 and only £580 remained to be paid.

 At the Parish AGM on 23rd Apr. 1931 presided by Canon Garland, Mr Low, one of the Church Wardens, advised the Parish was in an excellent financial position. Funds were in hand as the nucleus for the building a two new churches in the Parish. There was also acknowledgement of the fondness of the congregation for Cannon Garland and Rev. Neil Bertram.





- Re application for Permit to build a permanent Church at Ashgrove
- 1. The Church of England has no Church in Suburb including parts of Bardon, the whole of St John's Wood, Walter Bridge and Dorrington attached for Church purpose to Ashgrove. There are at least 800 known Church of England householders in this area. The application is for the purpose of creating a Church where none exists not replacing the existing building.
- 2. The only accommodation at present is a Church Hall, measuring 50ft x 30ft including 300 sq ft occupied by a stage which is used for the following
 - a. <u>Services of the Church</u>. The seating accommodation (100) is barely sufficient for ordinary use and quite inadequate for special occasions.
 - b. <u>Sunday School</u>. The eurolment is 220 scholars and 28 teachers. This includes 80 children of kindergarten age, who must use the stage. It is impossible (change to very difficult) to conduct an efficient school under such cramped conditions.
 - c. For all meeting and functions in connection with Church activities.
 - d. <u>Youth organisations.</u> Other accommodation has to be found for these, especially as there is no space for the storage of materials etc.

ENTHUSIASM AND HARD PHYSICAL WORK

Building Commenced

- The Courier Mail reported on 2nd Apr. 1951 that work had started on the new Anglican church (St Paul's) at Ashgrove.
- "The people who will later worship there assembled on the 31st March and 1st April 1951 with picks and shovels and barrows. Managers, clerks, craftsmen and youths gave up their leisure to begin excavating 300 tons of earth for the foundations.
- Their minister, Rev G R Gibson, conducted a neighbourly little service on the site, their womenfolk gave them tea when muscles flagged.
- Maybe it wasn't sensational but it was wonderful thing to see ..."




Sketch for St Paul's arches (note the cross at the apex of each arch)





WILL THE QUEEN STOP?

QUEEN MAY LAY WREATH

Queen Elizabeth may lay a wreath at the lych gate of St. Paul's Church of England, Ashgrove, during a procession through Brisbone suburbs next March 17

The lych gate is believed to be the only memorial in Australia to the late King

George VI.

The member for Kelvin Grove (Mr. J. A. Turner), who has approached the State Royal Tour Director (Mr. F. A. Manning), said yesterday it was hoped to have thousands of school children lining the immediate vicinity for the occasion.

17th Mar. 1954 - Hopeful the Queen will lay a wreath at the lych gate

- On the day, as the Royal progress approached St Paul's, Ashgrove, Judith Coombs, Helen Ferry and Elizabeth Conn, all 9 years old, stepped hopefully out from near the Church with a bouquet of pink gladioli, carnations and dahlias wrapped in transparent paper.
- But the Royal car kept moving. However, the Duke noticed the three girls in their white GFS frocks and veils and beckoned them over.
- The car was still moving, the three ran beside it, and the Duke smiling broadly, took the bouquet from them.
- Police estimated that there were between 10,000 and 15,000 people there when the Queen passed. Fifty reinforcements were brought up to swell the 100 police already spread out between Ashgrove and the bridge.

The Organ

- Organ built in 1955 by Whitehouse Bros at a cost of £2,701.17s.9d.
- 25th Sept. 1955 Archbishop Halse dedicated the organ.
- It was "one of the last by the firm to use pneumatic action, and one of the last such organs to be built in Australia."
- Around 1982 the organ was electrified by H.W. Jarrott, of Brisbane.

WILL THE CONSTRUCTION OF THE CHURCH BE FINISHED?

Hall repairs or Church extension?

- 25th Aug. 1957
- Urgent work of the hall was approved the floor was in bad condition, and better facilities for the kitchen and storage purposes were very necessary.
- It was not clear how far the hall work will be undertaken as an extension to the Church was also needed. Hardwood floor laid in hall over Christmas break - 1957 (Parish of Ithaca, Every Member Canvass Report for Period ending 25th August 1957)

 15th June 1962 the extension to the Church of St Paul's was dedicated.


